NHMRC Open Access Policy – How to comply

The <u>NHMRC Open Access Policy</u> **mandates** open access sharing of publications that arise from NHMRC-funded research. The policy also encourages open access to research data and requires that patents resulting from NHMRC funding be made findable through listing in <u>SourceIP</u>.

The aims of the policy are to increase dissemination and improve accessibility of research, increase reuse of research data, improve research integrity and contribute to a stronger knowledge economy.

Policy mandate applies to:

- **Peer-reviewed articles** and **peer-reviewed conference papers** that report on original research
- Grants awarded from **20 September 2022** [see below for information related to grants awarded prior to 20 September 2022]

Requirements:

- Publications arising from NHMRC funding must be **immediately open access** under a <u>Creative Commons Attribution</u> (CC BY) licence via one of 2 routes:
 - 1. Journal-based Open Access (Version of Record)

Making the *version of record* (i.e. published version) *immediately* open access with a CC BY licence

- May attract a fee or article processing charge (APC)
- NHMRC funding may be used towards APCs but APCs cannot be part of the grant application budget (see <u>Clause 1.3.5</u>)
- UTS Read & Publish agreements with select publishers may provide APC-free publication for open access articles see <u>UTS Library website</u> for details
- Contact <u>UTS Library</u> for help finding appropriate journals, understanding licencing requirements, or advice on UTS Read & Publish agreements
- 2. Repository-based [e.g. OPUS] (Author Accepted Manuscript)

Making the *Author Accepted Manuscript* (AAM) *immediately* open access with a CC BY licence by depositing the AAM in an open online repository such as an institutional repository (e.g. <u>OPUS</u>) or other subject-based repository.

 Author must include this statement when submitting the manuscript for publication to ensure licensing arrangements are in place prior to any publishing agreement:

'This research was funded in whole or part by the National Health and Medical Research Council [Grant number]. For the purposes of open access, the author has applied a CC BY public copyright licence to any Author Accepted Manuscript version arising from this submission'.

- A publisher-requested delay or 'embargo period' for the AAM does not meet the requirements of the Policy and should be refused
- Depositing work to OPUS is done via <u>Symplectic Elements</u> please ensure the publication record is linked to the correct grant record prior to depositing to

OPUS (see <u>Symplectic Manual</u> or contact <u>rkit@uts.edu.au</u> or <u>opus@uts.edu.au</u> for help)

• Publication metadata must also be in an institutional repository (e.g. <u>OPUS</u>) no later than 3 months after publication

Grants awarded prior to 22 September 2022

• Publications up to 31 Dec 2023 must be open access in a repository or other acceptable location within 12-month period as per old policy
